Matthew 10:5-15 The Call of the King to Proclaim

Let me pray for us

What gets you out of bed in the morning? Every bland day in lockdown life looks like every other day in lock down? It's hard to find the motivation to get up isn't it? What gets you out of bed, tells you what is important to you?

1990s supermodel Linda Evangelista once made this notorious quote about herself and her fellow supermodel Christy Turlington "We have this saying, Christy and I We don't wake up for less than \$10,000 a day" Maybe like Linda, it's money that gets you motivated

Maybe it's the new release on Netflix Or watching the Olympics Not great examples because you still watch these from your bed Maybe it's the needs of your children that are important? Maybe for those sickeningly motivated people It's the desire to exercise or to achieve their goals

The apostle Paul once said this in 1 Corinthians 15 ³ For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures

The thing that got the apostle Paul out of bed every morning Was the gospel of Jesus Christ A message that saved and transformed his own life A message that filled his prayers for others A message that he lived to proclaim to others Of *first importance* Paul says.

In last week's passage We heard of Jesus' compassion that led him to describe the crowd around him As harassed and helpless like sheep without a Shepherd And it was this compassion that led Jesus to pray To pray that God would raise workers for his harvest But what were these workers to do? They were to proclaim the gospel to others And that is what we will be looking at today

The Call of the King is to proclaim the gospel

This morning we are going to be looking at the call of King to proclaim And this is what Jesus is saying to his followers in our passage in Matthew 10

Proclaim the gospel Be prepared for peace or judgement

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We're going to look at each of these statements One by one

Firstly let's look at proclaiming the gospel

And we're going to answer these questions as we go What is the gospel? To whom are we to proclaim the gospel? How should we proclaim the gospel? And with what resources? **Let's have a look at what this gospel is** Having given his authority to the disciples Jesus sends them out with this instruction

Verse 7

⁷ As you go, proclaim this message: 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' The disciples are to do what Jesus did in own his ministry In chapter 9 verse 35 we see that the gospel That is the good news of God's coming kingdom is central to what Jesus does Repeatedly, we see this in the gospels Jesus has come to preach this gospel This gospel points people to the reality that Jesus is King And that His kingdom is coming And that people need to repent from sin and believe in Jesus the King And not only is Jesus proclaiming this gospel He is the content of this good news His death and resurrection Means our sin before God can be dealt with

By the time that the Apostle Paul is taking this gospel to non-Jews It is clear how important this gospel is 1 Corinthians 15 verse 1

Now, brothers and sisters, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, which you received and on which you have taken your stand. ² By this gospel you are saved, if you hold firmly to the word I preached to you. Otherwise, you have believed in vain.

The ministry of the apostles is to proclaim the gospel A gospel that they received from Jesus and is about Jesus A gospel that can save people from sin and death A gospel so important that clinging to it in faith is the only way to be saved And our gospel is no different to the one that Paul is proclaiming Because it has been passed down from generation to generation And it is this same gospel that the Scriptures speak of.

But secondly to whom should we preach the gospel?

And here we see that our situation is a bit different to the apostles. In verse 5 Jesus tells them to focus on the lost sheep of Israel Now does that mean that Jesus is a bit of a racist? Of course not, we see that in John chapter 4 It was Jesus himself who approached the Samaritan woman And on that day, many Samaritan people came to believe in Jesus It's not a matter of Jesus being biased, but there are stages in God's history of saving people The gospel goes first to the Jew, then to the Gentile

The apostle Paul says this very clearly in Romans 1:16 ¹⁶ For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile.

And remember that Matthew's original audience Were most likely Jewish Christians And on this first missionary journey Jesus just wants the gospel to spread firstly from Galilee to the rest of Israel

But clearly Jesus had a bigger picture in mind By the end of Matthew's gospel He commissions the disciples to take the gospel to all nations Matthew 28:19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations And this command remains for us today

Everyone, everywhere needs the gospel of Jesus Christ All sheep need their Shepherd

The Olympics has finally started

Proclaiming the gospel is like an Olympic torch relay The flame is received from one person And passed on to the next person For the Sydney Olympics The Olympic torch was passed through 1500 people in the South Pacific and New Zealand And then once it reached Australia 11,000 people carried the flame around the country Until Cathy Freeman finished lighting the torch at Sydney's Olympic Stadium

You see every generation of believers in Jesus are to do the same We receive the gospel We pass it on to others In all corners of the world Until the race is finished when the King returns

How should the gospel be proclaimed?

With clear displays of Jesus' power Verse 8

Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons. Freely you have received; freely give.

And again, just as Jesus was doing these signs and wonders The disciples have been given the authority to do the same And they went hand in hand with the gospel, These supernatural displays Were to show the power of God's kingdom breaking into the world But by the end of the gospel of Matthew We see that Jesus does not tell the disciples that the signs and wonders will be the key In Matthew 28 Instead, Jesus says that teaching people to obey Jesus will be the key So how should we think about this?

We are a church that emphasises the preaching and teaching of the gospel But often other churches are very focused on the supernatural stuff The danger of focussing on the supernatural and not the preaching of the gospel Is that the *miracles* don't lead to lasting faith In fact, the Pharisees saw Jesus do the miraculous, But it did not lead to faith in Jesus at all Expecting God to do the miraculous whenever you want At best, can lead to a sort of shallow consumeristic faith

But there can also be another danger, and that is believing that Jesus no longer does the miraculous

Years ago, I attended a conference and I met two Nepalese men Who were evangelists in the beautiful Pokhara region of Nepal I've blanked out their faces for security reasons But they told me how they walked from village to village in Nepal to share the gospel And they actually showed me how they shared the gospel in a sort of simple drama Because many people were illiterate in these remote villages One of them would do actions while the other would share the message with spoken words But they told me how often they were frustrated because although their priority was to share the gospel The first thing they often had to do was to drive out evil spirits and heal the sick Often because the local witch doctor would be yelling at them because he was possessed by an evil spirit And to be able to share the gospel they had to quiet the evil spirit first And so there were involved in these displays of the much greater power of Jesus Over the power of Satan and his kingdom of darkness And after this happened, people saw their power And would then bring their sick people for them to pray over And when they shared these things with me It reminded me so much of what we read in the gospels Of course these things can still happen today But it also struck me That the priority for these two men Was sharing the gospel first And the signs and wonders were only secondary

With what resources should we proclaim the gospel?

Verse 8

Freely you have received; freely give. ⁹ "Do not get any gold or silver or copper to take with you in your belts— ¹⁰ no bag for the journey or extra shirt or sandals or a staff, for the worker is worth his keep. ¹¹ Whatever town or village you enter, search there for some worthy person and stay at their house until you leave.

Jesus wants the disciples to travel light in their missionary journey. The motto of the Scouts is Be Prepared Be prepared for every situation But Jesus is saying here the very opposite Be dependent Be dependent on God Bring enough Just the clothes and shoes you're wearing Don't even bring a bag or money

Three principles stand out in these verses

Here's one You never charge people for sharing the gospel with them You received the gospel for free and you share it with others for free That's what Jesus says in verse 8

Here's another principle

The more prepared you are The less likely you are to depend on God In the Lord's prayer in Matthew 6 Jesus taught the disciples to pray Give us this day our daily bread It is God who provides us with what we need everyday Including providing for us when we share the gospel And God can do that through the generosity of other people As we see in verse 11 He can raise other people who can provide a living for those who share the gospel

And In verse 10, Jesus established an important principle

A worker is worth his keep

That word *keep* is important Jesus is not talking about a *wage* Churches don't pay pastors a wage but a stipend A wage is a payment for work done But a stipend is a payment so that someone can live And that's an important difference For example, pastors are not paid performance-based incentives Imagine what that would do to the gospel You get what you pay for And you get more bang for your buck So we should incentivise pastors to grow the church through their performance That's not how Jesus works He is not profit driven He is people driven A gospel worker doesn't do overtime for more money A gospel worker does it for Jesus and for His people But the gospel worker does have a *right* to a living.

If you have ever benefitted from someone proclaiming the gospel to you They have a right to a living And you might be in a position to pay them for their living And think of those who take the gospel to communities who can't afford to pay them a living Think of missionaries who go to much poorer communities Gospel generosity also leads you to pay a living for those missionaries Dave and Cathy Walter are AFES workers with the Christian Union groups in Queensland And the South Pacific But when I was a uni student Dave met with me Opened the bible with me And taught me the gospel for the majority of my uni life And when I graduated I made the commitment to support Dave and Cathy financially And that is something Emma and I have done since 1999 Why? Because a worker is worth his keep

On the flipside of this,

I have had potential missionaries ask me if it's wrong for them to buy a house Is Jesus saying that anyone who decides to proclaim the gospel Should never save or invest for the future? Because wouldn't that be a sign of not depending on God

Again we have to read the bible in light of other passages in the bible In 1 Timothy 6, Paul says that a believer should provide for their household Their own relatives Not doing so, brings disrepute to Jesus There is no such thing as let go and let God In fact that can be a shameful excuse for not fulfilling your responsibility Christians should *diligently* provide for their families And Proverbs 13 goes one step further to say that a good person Leaves an inheritance for future generations. So the thing I have said to potential missionaries If you're in a position to buy a house before you become a missionary Then there can be wisdom in buying a house To provide for yourself or for your family Especially when you come back from the mission field

But don't let that be the reason holding you back from going Especially looking at house prices in Melbourne If Jesus is convicting you to go and share the gospel Then it can be easy to find reasons to put this off It may mean that you never go.

As challenging as this pandemic has been on all people We living in Australia have been incredibly fortunate compared to so many around the world But we should not come to love the material comfort we are blessed with We have to take the warning seriously in Scripture The love of money is a root of all kinds of evil Houses will not provide us with lasting security only the gospel can Love of material things will lead us to destruction

Earlier this year, my family visited the Freshstart Presbyterian church plant in Donnybrook And there are a number of people from Bundy who are part of this church plant But what encouraged me was that for a number of these households The gospel is what shaped their house buying decision. If you go out to Donnybrook now There is nothing there right now Mostly, empty housing lots A few farms still Just one school No hospitals or medical centres No shopping centres It will take years for there to be the infrastructure we enjoy in established suburbs But tens of thousands of people will be moving into that suburb People who need to hear the gospel And that is why followers of Jesus are choosing to live there

Proclaiming the gospel leads to two very different responses And we need to be prepared for both

The first response is peace

In verse 11 ¹¹ Whatever town or village you enter, search there for some worthy person and stay at their house until you leave. ¹² As you enter the home, give it your greeting. ¹³ If the home is deserving, let your peace rest on it; if it is not, let your peace return to you.

When Jesus talks about a person being worthy here He's not talking about them being a deserving person, or a good person He's talking about their receptiveness to the apostles and their message Receiving those that Jesus has authorised is to receive Jesus himself And as was the custom in the day The apostles were to bless households with a greeting of peace The measure of whether Jesus' peace would remain on that household Was determined on whether they continued to be receptive to the gospel Peace is one response to the gospel

Lasting peace is what the gospel of Jesus offers

Colossians 1 verse 19 says

¹⁹ For God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him (that is Jesus), ²⁰ and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross.

Jesus' death on the cross brings real and lasting peace with God God's anger at our sin has been dealt with

And this is what is on offer when the gospel is proclaimed

But only for those who are receptive to this message

Those who welcome the free gift that is offered and receive it with thankful faith

But in contrast, To those who reject the apostles and the gospel There is judgement

Verse 14

¹⁴ If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, leave that home or town and shake the dust off your feet. ¹⁵ Truly I tell you, it will be more bearable for Sodom and Gomorrah on the day of judgment than for that town.

To reject the gospel and those who bring the gospel Is to reject Jesus There are consequences for rejecting the King Eventually if you say no to the King He will say no to you

It was a custom for very religious Jews Every time they left a Gentile territory and re-entered a Jewish territory To shake the dust off their sandals It was a way of saying that they didn't want anything to do with the pagan practises of the Gentiles Who sat under the judgement of God

Jesus is saying that shaking the dust of your feet Was something the apostles would adopt as a warning of judgement to anyone who rejected the gospel And this is what the apostle Paul did in Acts 13

⁴⁹ The word of the Lord spread through the whole region. ⁵⁰ But the Jewish leaders incited the God-fearing women of high standing and the leading men of the city. They stirred up persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and expelled them from their region. ⁵¹ So they shook the dust off their feet as a warning to them and went to Iconium.

To reject Jesus and his gospel is a serious thing. It means that you remain under his judgement And to bring home this message of judgement Jesus uses the example of Sodom and Gomorrah Cities synonymous in the bible for great sin and wickedness Cities that Lot and his children barely escaped from when God judged them In the book of Genesis We read of God bringing down his fiery judgement on Sodom and Gomorrah

Remember that the disciples are going to Jewish people on this journey Talk of this kind of judgement on Jewish people who reject Jesus Would have been as unpalatable a message As any talk of judgement today in our culture

There is no way a Jewish person in the time of Jesus Could ever have thought of themselves as being like Sodom and Gomorrah And yet here Jesus is saying to his own people That's right – even you who reject the gospel Sit under God's judgement A judgement that is *even worse* Than that of Sodom and Gomorrah

We forget don't we,

That words of judgement come out of the mouth of Jesus Talk of hell Talk of God's wrath against our sin God's anger remaining on those who reject His gospel

But if Jesus is King Then he has the right to be treated as King And if we say no to Jesus, eventually He will give us what we want and we will face the consequences for our sin

It's an unpopular message today But you know what, it makes Jesus real You see often we want people around us who tell us what we want to hear Who never disagree with us And we think that is loving In fact we cancel people out of our lives when they don't agree with us We want a relationship on our terms But that's not real relationship is it?

Jesus is far better than this The relationship he offers is real He is compelling, confronting and comforting He is the most compelling person you will ever meet People were drawn to him like they were drawn to no other and they still are today He is the most confronting person you will ever meet – Did he just say that to me? And he is the most comforting person you will ever meet Welcoming even those whom you would reject

Even in the passages we have been looking at these last two Sundays Jesus is the Compassionate Shepherd who brings peace to the lost But he is also the King who brings judgement for sin And The cross of Christ tells us how committed Jesus is to both peace and judgement

And so when we proclaim the gospel of Christ We must not sell the real Jesus short We must not emphasise the peace of Jesus at the expense of His judgement And neither must we emphasise judgement at the expense of peace

Let me tie some application together Proclaim don't Perspire

You see whenever there is talk of proclaiming the gospel Any talk of evangelism and most of you listening Start to sweat

We are stressed about sharing the gospel for all sorts of reason

Let me say why you don't need to sweat for one important reason And that's the *result* of evangelism I want you to notice in the passage today Jesus tells his disciples to proclaim the gospel But he doesn't tell them that they are responsible for the result Whether people are receptive and it ends in peace Or whether they reject the gospel and remain under judgement Has nothing to do with the responsibility of the apostles Their role is simply to proclaim the gospel In other words, don't sweat the stuff that's outside of your control Your job is simply to share Christ with others. We often make evangelism harder than it needs to be. We make ourselves the focus It's up to me I need to get it right The focus of sharing the gospel is actually Jesus It's his gospel It comes with his power not ours And all we have to do is share Jesus with others

I'm going to give you some homework:

I want you to answer this question.

What does Jesus mean to you?

If Jesus is important to you If he makes a difference to your life You should be able to explain why he's important to you See if you can do that this afternoon Write down on a piece of paper Or type down on your phone Why he's so important to you Better still, Once you've done that Practice sharing that with someone living in your household Why Jesus is important to you Then pray for God to bring an opportunity in your life to share that explanation with someone who is yet to meet Jesus

Here's another application

Proclamation of the gospel is a team sport

Proclaiming the gospel is less like golf and more like AFL You see if evangelism is like golf Then you do it on your own You just get one pro who wins all the majors One super gifted individual and they are the one who does all the evangelism

But you see what Jesus does He chooses a team – twelve disciples and he sends them out You sharing this gospel is not just about one person doing the work All of us are part of that team An AFL team has 18 players Not to mention interchange players and substitutes But that's just on field Off the field is the senior coach Line coaches, physios, team doctors Strength and conditioning people Sports science and nutrition specialists **Psychologists** There's a board and a chairperson There's an operations manager A CEO A membership department A marketing and communications department I could go on but you get the picture To win a premiership is very challenging, Just ask a St Kilda supporter But in order to win a premiership Everyone on the team needs to do their part And it is the same with evangelism

Chris Shaw, one of our pastors Runs our Christianity Explored course Where people get to hear the gospel Often for the first time But not everyone is gifted for the evangelism Chris does But everyone has a role on the team People are brought by friends to attend this course Friends who have often prayed for years Chris uses bible study and video resources created by others Chris has run that course with Jo and Ellie helping him This is a team sport

Here I am teaching the bible to you now through a livestream from an empty building
And the fact I can do this requires a team
It requires Cat to maintain this website you're watching from
Andrew to create the YouTube stream
Dave and James to operate the cameras and the livestream
Paul to operate the sound
And I'm doing this from a building that is maintained by our board
Run with finances provided by this congregation
Proclaiming the gospel is a team sport.
And there is a place for you on the team
Don't just watch as a spectator.
Ask, what can I do on the team?
Then come to one of the pastors and we will help you find a way to serve on the team.

Last question: Is the gospel of first importance? Jake Bilardi was an intelligent and articulate student But he was bullied at school and described as a loner by classmates

In 2012, Jake's mother died of cancer

And the final steps of his radicalisation were nearing completion

After years of research on Islam, he said this on his blog:

I was growing tired of the corruption and filthiness of Australian society and yearned to live under the Islamic State with the Muslims.

He joined Islamic State Fighters and fled to Iraq in August 2014

In 2015, as an 18 year old,

Jake Bilardi carried out a failed suicide bomb attack in Baghdad

Killing only himself

Where do you think Jake grew up?

Craigieburn, just 20 minutes drive from here in Bundoora

I remember feeling heartbroken hearing Jake's story

And I thought at the time,

If only someone could have invited Jake to our Youth Group

Where he would have been welcomed with love by our youth leaders

Where he would have heard the good news of Jesus

His Shepherd

The King who gave his life for Him

Jake would have heard a message of welcome by Jesus

A message of grace

Not the message of rejection he received at high school

Not the lies of false shepherds that used him and threw him away

Maybe, just maybe, Jake's path could have been very different

Is the gospel of first importance?

Of course it is

Is the gospel worth getting out of bed for?

Of course it is

It is a message of lasting hope

Of eternal life

Of forgiveness

Of unfailing love

It is a message that saves and transforms people

But is the gospel of first importance to you?

Let me pray.
