Mark 5:21-6:6 Comforting Authority

Tonight we continue our series in Mark's gospel And last Sunday in the first half of chapter 5 We saw the *confronting* authority of Jesus The strength of Jesus, Son of the Most High God over the Legion of demons tormenting a man And tonight in the second half chapter 5 we see the *comforting* authority of Jesus As he meets two people grappling with sickness and death

Let me pray

Have you ever found yourself in a situation of complete and utter helplessness In my first few years at uni I had the tendency to leave things until the last minute I had a few subjects where I opened the textbook from its plastic wrapping On the night before the exam As I was aiming just to pass the subject I'm not proud of it now So please learn from this terrible attitude of your church pastor Anyway it all came to spectacularly backfire on me when I scored 48.8 percent In my second year Biochemistry exam And if you don't know how close I was to passing I prepared a slide to show you

And that was a problem because I wanted to major in third year Biochem And I didn't want to repeat a whole year of uni, just to do that And so I did what a helpless person does I wrote a letter to Professor Wettenhall Head of Biochem at Melbourne Uni On my knees pleading for a supplementary exam I can't remember what I wrote I probably put in a slide like that one And incredibly he allowed me to sit a supplementary exam that Summer And I passed and I went on to major in Biochemistry And here I am today as a pastor of a local church

That is not a real example of being helpless That is a better example of being foolish I think the first time I felt really helpless Was at the start of VCE when I was 17 and my parents told us they were getting divorced And there have been recent times of feeling helpless Like late last year when a relative was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer Some of you have already had these times in your life And if you haven't yet you will Times when you feel the ground beneath you give away When you feel sick and close to despair What do you then? Who do you turn to? Tonight, we're going to meet two people who were feeling utterly helpless And in their desperation they turn to Jesus

Let's meet the first person - Jairus

Jairus' daughter - part 1 (5:21-24)

²¹ When Jesus had crossed over again by boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered around him while he was by the sea. ²² One of the synagogue leaders, named Jairus, came, and when he saw Jesus, he fell at his feet ²³ and begged him earnestly, "My little daughter is dying. Come and lay your hands on her so that she can get well and live." ²⁴ So Jesus went with him, and a large crowd was following and pressing against him.

After the rejection of the people at Gerasenes Jesus returns to the other side of Lake Galilee We're not told exactly where but it's possible its Capernaum where Jesus has been before And if it's Capernaum It's not surprising that there is already a mob of people waiting for him Back in chapter 1 we're told that the whole town came to Jesus Where he healed many of sickness Maybe word had already travelled that Jesus was coming The crowd is right there waiting for Jesus as he gets off the boat The thing was that the healing was not the main thing Jesus came for Teaching the gospel is why he came it says back in chapter 1 In fact the healing made life more difficult because it brought the crowds And it meant that Jesus had to move to more remote places But Jesus continues to heal because of his compassion

And forcing his way to the front of the crowd we meet Jairus Someone who must have had some status in the town The synagogue was a local place of worship Where Jewish people would go to pray to God And hear the Scriptures read and taught Jairus as the synagogue ruler, would have had the role of choosing and supervising Those who read and taught the scriptures So Jairus is someone of influence But that doesn't matter to Jesus Because right now he is just a helpless father in need His daughter is not only sick, she's dying And Jairus is someone who shows faith in Jesus in his hour of helplessness

And right throughout Mark's gospel Mark gives us snapshots of people who have faith in Jesus And these are clues for his readers in helping us to know what faith looks like for us The faith that Jesus responds to Back in chapter 2 we see Jesus responding to the faith of the paralysed man's friend

Back in chapter 2 we see Jesus responding to the faith of the paralysed man's friends Later in Mark 7 we see the faith of the Syrophoenician woman in seeking Jesus to drive out a demon from her daughter

In Mark 10 we see the faith of Bartimaeus the blind man crying out to Jesus for mercy

And here in chapter 5 we see two people responding to Jesus in faith.

What does this faith look like? I call it DDT Desperate Dependent Trust Jairus is desperate and dependent on Jesus because he is all out of options He turns to and trust in Jesus Because he knows Jesus alone can do something about his situation There are often times when I feel very helpless in my job But the times where I have felt the most helpless is with families with sick or dying children Once I was with a couple at the Royal Children's Hospital It was late, about 10 or 11 at night And this couple's daughter needed urgent surgery She had been born very premature at 27 weeks And there was a perforation in her intestine And I was with the couple when one of the surgical team said to them "Your daughter will die unless we operate" The surgeons went into the operating theatre with their tiny daughter Who could fit into one hand And the three of us sat outside the operating theatre I felt completely helpless And I can only imagine how helpless this couple felt And so I did the only thing I could do with them I prayed with them and we cried out to God for mercy and healing And God heard and answered those prayers As the surgical team were able to fix the perforation And that tiny baby is now a happy and healthy girl in primary school

I can't read about Jairus' daughter without thinking of this incident And remembering that sense of helplessness But the good thing is, Jesus sees our helplessness And he responds to DDT Jesus is willing, he goes with Jairus to walk towards his home

Walking with a crowd pressing in on you Wanting a piece of you Must have been frustratingly slow Especially for Jairus And what would be worse is if Jesus stopped for some reason.

Enter the bleeding woman

Verse 25

²⁵ Now a woman suffering from bleeding for twelve years ²⁶ had endured much under many doctors. She had spent everything she had and was not helped at all. On the contrary, she became worse. ²⁷ Having heard about Jesus, she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his clothing.

²⁸ For she said, "If I just touch his clothes, I'll be made well." ²⁹ Instantly her flow of blood ceased, and she sensed in her body that she was healed of her affliction.

This crowd of people following Jesus Is the perfect context for this woman Because she is on a secret mission You see she shouldn't be there in that crowd According to the ceremonial laws of Leviticus 15 Because of her constant bleeding she would have been considered unclean According to the Old Testament law, Certain bodily discharges of men and women Made you unclean for a period of time Now note, this was not a law regarding morality It's not that this lady is sinning in her bleeding But her bleeding made her ritually unclean The laws in relation to being clean and unclean Were a matter of reminding the people of the holiness of God and how to approach Him And how to live with His people That means she could not worship at the temple And she could not come into contact with others

So imagine how much suffering this woman is going through There's the physical suffering – the actual bleeding The economic suffering – she's spent all her savings on medical treatment that doesn't work The emotional suffering – this has been going on for twelve long years The social suffering – she's isolated from people otherwise they become unclean The spiritual suffering – her uncleanness means she can't worship at the temple This lady is completely different to Jairus No status, no influence, ritually unclean Jairus falls dramatically in front of the crowd at Jesus' feet This woman quietly sneaks through the crowd to get to Jesus' feet But one thing she has in common with Jairus And that's her DDT

In a state of complete helplessness Her desperate dependent trust drives her to Jesus "Maybe he can do something for me" And he does. The instant she touches his cloak Her bleeding stops She's been highly aware of her body for years And she knows she's been healed by Jesus That's the first part of the mission accomplished Now to quietly sneak away without anyone finding out.

Except she's busted

Verse 30

³⁰ Immediately Jesus realized that power had gone out from him. He turned around in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?"

³¹ His disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing against you, and yet you say, 'Who touched me?'"

³² But he was looking around to see who had done this.

Jesus felt something too And he knows someone is responsible He stops on his journey to Jairus' house And he looks around at the crowd And imagine how the woman is feeling Hoping against hope that Jesus won't lock his gaze on her Perhaps even worse than the suffering of the bleeding Is now the risk of shame in an honour shame culture Jesus might expose her for what she's done How she's been bleeding for twelve years How she shouldn't be there How she's taken something from him without asking She is incredibly vulnerable So rather than being found out She decides to come clean

Verse 33

³³ The woman, with fear and trembling, knowing what had happened to her, came and fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. ³⁴ "Daughter," he said to her, "your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be healed from your affliction."

Jesus' reaction to her is completely unexpected Last week, we saw the confronting authority of Jesus His frightening power to rebuke storms and demons And the woman is expecting this kind of authority from Jesus And what she gets instead is the comforting authority of Jesus Instead of calling her Unclean, Jesus calls her Daughter Instead of rebuking her for taking from him, Jesus commends her faith that has saved her Instead of fearful shame, Jesus leaves her with peace and healing

Rebecca McLaughlin in her book Jesus through the eyes of women puts it so well

Instead of humiliating this woman Jesus validates her. She's been excluded from the temple for 12 years and now she's welcomed by the one who is the temple where we meet with God. If we come to Jesus with our need, our desperation, and our shame, we can know he will receive us with tenderness too. He may not heal us here and now. He doesn't promise that. But when we come to him in need, he surely turns himself toward us and receives us, just as he received this woman's touch and justified her actions: "Daughter your faith has made you well"

It's a beautiful scene isn't it? The comforting authority of Jesus responded to this woman's DDT Why? Because of his compassion Jesus gave this woman more than she could have asked for or imagined

Jairus's daughter - part 2 (5:35-43)

But let's not forget Jairus For with this pause to speak to this woman Precious seconds are ticking by Can you imagine Jairus quietly tearing his hair out? And then the unthinkable happens Verse 35 ³⁵ While he was still speaking, people came from the synagogue leader's house and said, "Your daughter is dead. Why bother the teacher anymore?" ³⁶ When Jesus overheard what was said, he told the synagogue leader, "Don't be afraid. Only believe."

Those words, "Your daughter is dead" Must have sucked the life out of Jairus There is nothing worse than outliving your children What must have made it worse is thinking "if only" Jesus was so near my house "If only" I had gotten to him earlier "If only" he hadn't stopped But it doesn't matter now, she's dead In that moment, Jesus says "No need for fear Jairus, just faith" – Only Believe You know that DDT you showed before I want you to show it again

They reach the house

Verse 37

³⁷ He did not let anyone accompany him except Peter, James, and John, James's brother. ³⁸ They came to the leader's house, and he saw a commotion—people weeping and wailing loudly. ³⁹ He went in and said to them, "Why are you making a commotion and weeping? The child is not dead but asleep." ⁴⁰ They laughed at him, but he put them all outside.

As Jesus did from time to time in Mark's gospel He takes only his inner circle of three disciples with him – Peter, James and John They will be the witnesses of what happens next

They get to the house

And it's possible that there were professional mourners at Jairus' house Like there is in some Asian countries Hence why they moved from weeping to laughing Which seems pretty insensitive They find what Jesus says about this girl delusional Jairus' daughter is well and truly dead not asleep

Verse 40

He took the child's father, mother, and those who were with him, and entered the place where the child was. ⁴¹ Then he took the child by the hand and said to her, "Talitha koum" (which is translated, "Little girl, I say to you, get up"). ⁴² Immediately the girl got up and began to walk. (She was twelve years old.) At this they were utterly astounded. ⁴³ Then he gave them strict orders that no one should know about this and told them to give her something to eat.

Here in this young girl's room filled with death and grief Jesus shows us once again His comforting authority He reaches out to touch the hand of this dead body Something that should have made Jesus ritually unclean But this is the Son of God Most High Jesus is not afraid of death's curse Instead the power that healed the bleeding woman Now brings the dead to life And with those precious words, "Little girl get up" Jesus wakes the dead as easily as I wake my children from an afternoon nap

Those words Jesus said to Jairus, "only believe" Would have been ringing in his ears As he stood there dumbfounded As with the bleeding woman, Because of his compassion Jesus has done more for Jairus than he could ever ask for or imagine

And as always the first application for us is not what should we do But who is Jesus We should walk away tonight with a bigger, richer, deeper understanding of who Jesus is And the thing I want you to see tonight is that Jesus is both strong *and* gentle

If you came last week You have already seen the commanding strength of Jesus He is strong over storms and demons Tonight you've seen his strength again This time over sickness And the greatest enemy - death itself

But I also want you to see the gentleness of Jesus Look at how he calls the woman who's been suffering for twelve years "Daughter" And treats her with such love and dignity Giving her not only healing for her body, But also dignity in front of the crowd Because her Saviour does not consider her unclean

Look at the gentleness of Jesus with this twelve-year old girl He told them not to tell others about her resurrection Not for his own sake but I think for this girl's sake He didn't want her swamped by the town's busy bodies And he is also concerned that she has food Because dying must really work up an appetite

One of the Old Testament prophecies that Jesus fulfils is found in Isaiah 42 Where it says of him:

³ He will not quarrel or cry out;

no one will hear his voice in the streets.

⁴ A bruised reed he will not break, and a smoldering wick he will not snuff out,

Think about how fragile a bruised reed is To most people a bruised reed is useless – something to be rejected and discarded But for Jesus - bruised reeds are broken people Wounded physically, emotionally, mentally, socially, spiritually The bleeding woman is a bruised reed Jairus and his daughter are bruised reeds The gentle ministry of Jesus is not about violence and oppression The gentle ministry of Jesus is not about control and abuse

There's this misconception that gentleness is weakness That is not the case at all I hope what you're seeing is that Jesus is not weak but gentle Gentleness is strength under control Strength used not for self-seeking purposes But used for the good of others

There are plenty of people who are strong but harsh Strong but self-promoting

Strong but aggressive and controlling

Can I ask you who this is?

Andrew Tate since last year has been blowing up on social media

He's already been banned from a couple of platforms

But for many boys and young men

He has become a model of masculine strength

A professional kickboxer

With a self-disciplined, shredded physique

Always standing in front of a luxury jet, car or mansion

Surrounded by attractive women

Sexually dominant

Outspoken against woke elites and cancel culture

Self-styled as a defender of traditional values of men doing their duty

Providing for and protecting women

Many believe that all this is a thin veil for aggressive misogyny

Tate is currently in a Romanian prison with his brother Tristan

Under investigation for rape and trafficking of women

Millions of his opponents are cheering

Millions of his supporters deny all the charges

And affirm that he is innocent and he has been framed

He has ex-girlfriends defending him

He has ex-girlfriends accusing him of being abusive and controlling If you're a bloke

You can pay \$49 per month to join his "Hustlers University"

That's right that's what its called

And he will disciple you in how to live like him

And the website just has multiple pictures of Andrew Tate everywhere

With his Bugatti

With his jet

All paid for with blokes coughing \$49 per month

And if you're a bloke he is more than willing to take money from you

Using one of the many web cam girls he employs to deceive you out of money

You see Andrew Tate uses his strength to help Andrew Tate

And there's something insecure about a guy always needing to tell you Just how strong and successful he is

He needs to flex all the time This is not real strength There is nothing strong about Andrew "Cobra" Tate And yet he is attracting a massive following for his so called strength

If in some way you are drawn to this as a model of strength You can do so, so much better Next time you're utterly helpless, Next time you are in a desperate situation Would you turn to someone like the Cobra?

Jesus is the strongest person in every room he's in But he never feels the need to flex Jesus is the strongest person in every room But He never feels the need to dominate others Jesus is the strongest person in every room But he never needs to promote his own brand Because Jesus is also the gentlest person in every room And because he's the gentlest You can turn to him in your helplessness Because he's the gentlest you can be weak in front of him You can be dependent on His strength Because He will never use his strength to harm you Look at Jesus on the cross He had the strength to destroy those who hated him And in his gentleness he died for them instead

How many people do you know in your life who are both strong *and* gentle? I suspect you know a lot of people who are one or the other but never both This is why you need the comforting authority of Jesus

After this, Jesus and his disciples leave the Galilee region And head to his hometown of Nazareth And here we learn something of Jesus' family – he was the oldest of four brothers And he had more than one sister. And Mary is mentioned but not Joseph So it seems likely that Joseph might have passed away already at this point

Now you would think that Jesus would be returning to a hero's welcome in his home town Word would have travelled about all the amazing things he was doing And now they could see Jesus' ministry firsthand And as Jesus does – the first thing he does is he teaches at the local synagogue And his hometown recognises something of his authority They see the wisdom in his teaching They recognise the power in his miracles But here is the conclusion they reach

Verse 3

So they were offended by him.⁴ Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honour except in his hometown, among his relatives, and in his household." ⁵ He was not able to do a

miracle there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and healed them. ⁶ And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Wow I used to think Australia started the Tall Poppy Syndrome But clearly it could never have been worse than in Nazareth I mean this is where the Son of God was raised Surely his family, his friends, his neighbours would be the first to recognise his identity? And it turns out the opposite is true Remember that phrase Familiarity breeds contempt That is what the Nazarenes show Jesus They are full of FBC

Familiarity Bred Contempt They are offended Even his family back in chapter 3 think that Jesus is out of his mind "Who does you think you are mate?" "You think you're better than us – carpenter boy?" Even Jesus was amazed at their unbelief And Jesus couldn't heal there not because he didn't have the power to heal Jesus didn't heal because Jesus responds to faith And he could not see much faith in his hometown

So why does Mark records this episode right next to Jairus and the bleeding woman I think it's to contrast two different responses to Jesus And to put that question before us How will you respond? FBC or DDT

Australia as a nation at the moment is full of FBC A country with a Christian Heritage Whether that was in parliament or schools or hospitals But Australia is now in a post-Christian era "Yeah yeah, we know all that Christian stuff" "And look where it got us" "The Stolen Generation" "The Royal Commission into Institutional Child Abuse" "No trading on Sundays" "Anti-marriage equality" "I'm familiar with what Christianity gave us" "We have moved on from all that rubbish" Many Australians today have contempt towards Christianity And the sad thing is that most of the people who have contempt for Christianity Have never even heard much about Jesus But it's not just the nation as a whole is it?

It's also individuals like me or maybe you People you who think we are familiar with all this I grew up going to church my whole chiuldhood and teenage years I went to an Anglican School for four years I attended Sunday school and heard many Bible stories But by the time I got to uni I couldn't have told you that much about Jesus Who he is and what he did

When I got to uni I decided to sort out what I believed I joined three different Christian clubs during O-Week One of the groups was the Christian Union And I met this guy Dave Walter Dave patiently opened the gospel of Mark with me And we read it together Week by week he answered my questions And I got to know Jesus A couple of years earlier When my parents separated I felt that God was distant And Dave showed me from the Bible That God never abandoned me How could he when He sent Jesus to find me If Dave hadn't helped me I could well have ended up with FBC Instead Dave led me to DDT in Jesus And this changed the course of my life And I will be forever grateful to Dave and to God

Maybe you've grown up in a Christian family Attended church Maybe you attended a Catholic school Or you went to Mass or Chapel Services Or maybe you have visited the temple or mosque with your family You're familiar with it, you think

But do you actually know Jesus? Do you know his teaching? Do you know what he did on the cross and why? Do you know what he claimed about himself? You cannot make a decision about Christianity Without actually knowing Jesus

Don't make the same mistake as Nazareth It would would be a real shame To reject Jesus without knowing him You owe it to yourself to get to know the real Jesus

I want to look at the DDT that Jesus responds to The faith of Jairus and the bleeding woman is not perfect Jairus believed that Jesus could heal But there were limits to his faith I'm sure Jairus didn't believe that Jesus could raise the dead

And the bleeding woman's faith is a bit transactional isn't it Her faith didn't have any room for relating to Jesus It's trust mixed with a bit of superstition "If I just touch his clothes" And yet Jesus responds to both of their imperfect DDT

Now what this says to you Is that your faith in Jesus doesn't need to be perfect It might well be a work-in-progress Jesus knows this And what he does in this passage Is he shows us that he is worthy of our faith However big or small it is He is stronger than we can imagine So Jesus says to Jairus "Only believe"

In verse 34 Jesus said to the woman Your faith has saved you This means more than healing Jesus has come to save us completely Not just a healthy body But a right relationship with the living God That word save takes on a new meaning when we see what Jesus did on the cross Jesus died on the cross to save us To pay the price of our sin against God To save us from judgement and eternal death We were completely and utterly helpless We cannot pay that price ourselves We need a Saviour to bring us back to God All of us do So that he can call us daughters and sons

Faith is not just about asking for physical healing Or a share house or car park Or to pass an exam Faith that means that you can be forgiven of your sin against God Faith means that Jesus can bring you real hope after you die

On another occasion of complete helplessness Jesus was speaking to a woman called Martha Martha was a sister in a family he dearly loved Martha was at a place of utter helplessness because her brother Lazarus had just died And she like Jairus believed that Jesus could have prevented that death

And Jesus gave her these words in John chapter 11

²⁵ Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me, even if he dies, will live. ²⁶ Everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

And then he brought her beloved brother back to life But what if Jesus can raise not only Jairus' daughter and Lazarus But what if he can raise from the dead Everyone who believes in him? And what if he can deliver us from our greatest fears not just in this life But in the life to come? What do we need to fear if we no longer need to fear sin and death? Do you need to fear O-week and not making friends? College life and peer pressure? Choosing the wrong course? Interest rates and inflation? Housing affordability? Singleness? Divorce? Infertility? Stage 4 Cancer?

Jesus strong and gentle Knows our helplessness And he can deliver more than we can ask for or imagine And all He wants from you is desperate dependent trust. Do you believe this?
