Mark 15:42-16:8 – Easter Sunday Hope For Our Fears

The first death close to me that I ever experienced

Was that of my grandmother

I was ten at the time and she died quite suddenly from an unexpected illness at 59 I remember waking that day to see my mum and my aunties all sitting in a room crying I didn't cry until the funeral

I read Psalm 23 at my grandmother's funeral service

At the front of the church in front of everyone

I was wearing that school uniform in the picture

And then immediately after I finished doing that reading in the service

The dam wall broke and tears came flooding down my face

The fear that I would never see my grandmother again hit me hard

I would never taste the noodles she made for me after school

I would never hear her voice again

We had just moved to Melbourne a few months before

And I had just started at a new school

And my grandmother who lived with us in Sydney

One of the sources of comfort and stability in my life was now gone

And to be honest, it felt like all my fears were going to swallow me up

Have you ever felt like that?

That you were going to be overwhelmed by your fears?

I think if we were completely honest

Most of us, most of the time, live under the shadow of all kinds of fears?

If that is you, I'm glad that you're here.

Because for followers of Jesus,

All around the world today

Easter Sunday represents Hope for our greatest fears

Billions of Christians around the world will be rejoicing in the hope

That Jesus rose from the dead

And that all who trust in Him will also rise from the dead

And I want to show you from the last chapter in Mark's gospel

The Risen Jesus is the Hope for Our Fears

I want to look at three point
The Risen Jesus is hope for our fear of people
Our fear of guilt and shame
And our fear of grief and dreath

Here's our first point

The Risen Jesus overcomes our fear of people

As we read on Good Friday

Jesus has died on the cross, giving his life as a ransom for the sin of many

The temple curtain was torn in two

And the Roman centurion overseeing his execution declares him to be the Son of $\operatorname{\mathsf{God}}$

This is what happens nect

We're told in verse 43 that Joseph of Arimathea
Went to the Roman Prefect Pilate to ask for Jesus' body
And we're given some background to Joseph
He was a prominent member of the Sanhedrin
This was the ruling council of Jerusalem made up of 70 men
And they were the ones who accused and tried Jesus falsely

We're told in John's gospel

That Joseph of Arimathea was a secret disciple of Jesus because of his fear of the Jews So can you imagine how painful it must have been for Joseph

Seeing Jesus being treated so unfairly in this fake trial

Torn between his conviction to stand up for Jesus His Lord

And his fear for himself if he spoke out in favour of Jesus

How would the other members of the Sanhedrin treat him

if they knew he was a follower of Jesus?

But now his love for Jesus overcame his fear of people

Clearly Joseph didn't think that Jesus was coming back from the dead

But he didn't want Jesus' body to be dumped like a lot of bodies after crucifixion

And so he plucked up the courage to out himself as a follower of Jesus

To the roman prefect Pilate no less

Surely this news would travel to the other members of the Sanhedrin eventually

Once Joseph receives the body of Jesus he wraps the body in cloth

And places the body in his family tomb

Where other members of his family would come to be buried in time

Just like this one in Jerusalem called the Garden Tomb

And you had to have some wealth and status to own a tomb carved out of the stone like this And what we're starting to see is that following Jesus wasn't just for people of low status People like fisherman and tax collectors and prostitutes

Even people of high status like Joseph or Nicodemus are now following Jesus

People with more to lose it seems

So it would have been easy for Joseph to give in to his fear of people

To remain a secret disciple

And yet Joseph decided to take the risk to do this act of incredible devotion for his Lord.

I love that the gospels record Joseph's name – he is secret no more

I love that he treats Jesus like a member of his own family

Which is saying that Joseph didn't stay in his fear

Love overcame fear

And this wasn't even the risen Jesus helping Joseph overcome his fear

In his mind Jesus was staying dead but how much must Joseph have loved him to do this.

Imagine Joseph's reaction when he eventually saw the risen Jesus!

Well how about us.

I want to put a thought in your head if you're someone who identifies with Joseph

As a secret follower of Jesus

or someone secretly investigating Christianity

I want you to think about the people you fear the most if they found out

Now I want you to imagine one day being so full of love for Jesus

And so full of his love for you

That you could overcome that fear of these people

I think that's why Joseph's story is recorded here

If it was possible for him Maybe it's possible for you.

Here's our second point

The Risen Jesus overcomes our fear of guilt and shame

It's Sunday morning, what Christians came to call the "first day of the week".

Two days have passed since Jesus' crucifixion and burial

And because it was the Sabbath, the day before

The women had to wait to anoint the body of Jesus until the Sunday

Now this was also an act of devotion shown by the women

Given the state that the body would normally have been in.

And the purpose of this visit was for the women to pour sweet smelling perfumes and spices to offset the smell of the body and so honour Jesus in this way

And maybe they didn't know that this had already been done by Joseph

as recorded in John's gospel

But maybe they know and this was also their expression of love in their grief

But they hadn't thought about how they were going to get inside the tomb

Because to close the entrance to the tomb

There would normally be a large carved circular rock

That would need to be rolled into a groove to seal the entrance

This rock would not be easily moved by these women

But to their astonishment the rock has been moved

The tomb is open and empty and there is a young man dressed in white inside the tomb

Matthew's gospel tells us that this man is an angel from God

And he is the one who moved the stone from the entrance

⁶ "Don't be alarmed," he told them. "You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they put him. ⁷ But go, tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you to Galilee; you will see him there just as he told you."

And here is the first thing to notice about what the angel says about Jesus.

Jesus is a promise keeper

He is going ahead of you to Galilee just as he told you.

This is referring to what Jesus said to his disciples the night of his arrest

Chapter 14 verse 28

But after I have risen, I will go ahead of you to Galilee."

And it has happened just as Jesus promised.

But there's another thing to notice about Jesus

Well notice who's not here at the tomb

The men

The disciples who have gone into hiding

When Jesus gave himself over to be arrested

They ran in fear for their lives

Now look carefully at what the angel said to pass on to the disciples

But go, tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you to Galilee; you will see him there just as he told you.'"

Notice those two words – and Peter

Why is Peter being singled out from the remaining eleven disciples

Because remember what Peter promised Jesus at the last supper

This is Mark 14

²⁹ Peter told him, "Even if everyone falls away, I will not... ³¹ But he kept insisting, "If I have to die with you, I will never deny you."

And that same night he denied knowing Jesus on three separate occasions

Peter wept bitterly with the knowledge that he had broken his promise

to Jesus His Lord and friend

And short of the betrayal of Judas.

What Peter did to Jesus was incredibly shameful

Imagine someone you knew and loved

Someone whom you had spent years of your life with

Telling others that they never knew you

Imagine the amount of guilt and shame Peter would have carried

over these two long days and nights

Imagine the fear that Peter would have carried to the grave

That this could be the defining moment of his life

This shameful denial of Jesus

And now that Jesus was dead there was no way to right that wrong with Jesus

And then to hear those words from Jesus "and Peter"

"You will see me in Galilee just as I told you"

Peter, despite what you did to me, you are welcome to see me again

I can forgive you

Your promise breaking will never outdo my promise keeping.

This is who Jesus died on the cross for

People like Peter,

People like you and me

People stained by the shame and guilt of broken promises

People who carry the burden of our sin against God and others

He came to wash our stains away through his death on the cross

To open up the way for us to be forgiven

So as to be in a right relationship with God.

And the resurrection is the proof of this living hope.

Years later, Peter was to write these words about the resurrection of Jesus. 1 Peter 1.

³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Because of his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead ⁴ and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you.

Peter wrote these words to Christians who were suffering persecution

Who were tempted to deny Jesus in the face of suffering

And he knew what the risen Jesus meant to him

And could mean to others

Great mercy - Living hope - Eternal life in heaven with God.

I want you to put yourself in Peter's shoes

What is the guilt and shame that you carry before God?

Now imagine living with the fear

that you will die carrying that guilt and shame to your grave

Now imagine the resurrected Jesus

Who already knows your guilt and shame

Saying to you "and Peter"

Except he says your name "and Clinton", "and Helen", "and Amir", "and Andy"

Could Jesus' invitation to you be better than living with this guilt and shame?

Imagine one day sitting at a meal with the risen Jesus

That's what he did with his disciples by Lake Galilee

Freshly caught fish roasted on an open fire

Imagine one day instead of them

Jesus invites you to sit down with for a meal with him

Knowing that what he did on the cross

Was more than enough to cover your guilt and shame

And that even though you hate yourself for what you've done

His love for you is even greater

This is what Jesus offers you in his resurrection

The risen Jesus is hope for your fear of guilt and shame

Lastly, the risen Jesus is hope for our fear of grief and death

As you read chapter 16 of Mark's gospel

The elephant in the room is that this is a very strange ending to the gospel of Mark

We never meet the risen Jesus

Only an angel telling us that he is risen

And then once the angel tells the women to tell the disciples

We are left with the women being afraid and silent.

This is not a Hollywood happy ending where the loose ends are tied up neatly

It's more like an arthouse indie movie where you're left wondering what happens next

And it's clear that there were others who thought this as well

If you're reading this in your printed bible or even the app on your phone

You can see a number of verses printed after verse 8 - Verses 9-20

Except they appear in a section with the description

"some of the earliest manuscripts conclude with verse 8"

And if you pick up just about every commentary on Mark's gospel

Scholars believe that this later section was added by a well-meaning scribe

And not written by Mark

Clearly this scribe wasn't very satisfied with the ending and so he added an appendix

And if you read verses 9-20 you can tell they are written by another author

because the style is quite different and perhaps the scribe wanted to appear very different so as not to confuse readers.

This scribe's ending was then copied after he added it

But the earliest surviving copies of Mark's gospel did not have verses 9-20

So the common conclusion is that the original version of Mark's ending

is what we see in verse 8

And that the later verses are interesting but not considered inspired by God

Now as to why Mark's gospel ends so abruptly in verse 8

Some scholars think it's a deliberate ending by Mark

and others think there was a longer ending that was damaged and lost

But whatever reason for the verse 8 ending

God did not think that we needed anything different other than this ending.

So let's work with verse 8

Firstly let me clarify that it is not meant to cast the women – Mary, Mary and Salome In a poor light

In fact, these women in the gospels are full of conviction and courage

In chapter 15 we learn that these and other women

Were so convicted of the ministry of Jesus

that they followed him and took care of Jesus and the disciples

In Luke 8 we learn that these women were the financial backers of Jesus' ministry

And in all of the gospels including Mark's gospel

The authors make a careful point of showing that the women were the eyewitnesses of the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus.

It was their testimony that we rely on in the Scriptures

Now that is quite a courageous thing given how noticeable it is that the male disciples of

Jesus were absent because they were scared of being arrested themselves

And if the disciples were making all this up

I'm sure they would have written it differently to cast themselves in a better light

And given that the testimony of women

Was not considered as important as men in that culture

They might well have made up that it was men who were the first eyewitnesses

to the death and resurrection of Jesus

But it is the women who are present because that is what happened

And they are named so that people could test their eyewitness testimony

But still why did the women respond with fear and silence?

Well to be honest, I think that would be a fairly normal response

Given that absolutely no one in this account expected Jesus to rise from the dead

It's as hard for people to believe in the resurrection then as it is now

So if you're a bit sceptical about the resurrection you're in good company

If someone you loved and devoted your life to following

Was killed brutally and unfairly

And while you were still deep in the grips of grief over their death

Visiting the cemetery and finding an empty hole where they were buried

And then suddenly told by a stranger that they were alive

How do you think you would react?

Trembling, overwhelming astonishment

Speechless fear would be appropriate responses.

But there's more to think about

"Fear" in relation to Jesus is a common theme of Mark's gospel

Mark doesn't shy away from the fact that there is an awesome power of Jesus

That on several occasions provoked a fear in those present

When the disciples saw Jesus calm a wild storm on Lake Galilee with a few words

They went from fearing the storm to fearing him

When Jesus drove out the legion of evil spirits from a man

Leaving him transformed – calm and in his right mind

The townspeople are scared of Jesus

When the disciples saw Jesus walking on water

They are terrified of him because they think he's a ghost

When Peter saw Jesus transfigured in dazzling white standing

with two prophets who had long since died

Peter is frightened

And here at the empty tomb of Jesus

If it is true, that Jesus has conquered the great enemy of death itself

Even after confidently saying that he would

Well wouldn't you think that rightly provokes fear
One commentator William Lane puts it helpfully
"The account of the empty tomb is "soul-shaking""
When was the last time your soul was shaken?
That's my hope for you today on Easter Sunday
That your soul will be shaken by Jesus
All of us one day will stand at the edge of a dark abyss called death
When someone you love dies
Or when you yourself face death
And the fear of grief and death and what lays ahead after death
will threaten to swallow you up
Well what if there is a better fear?
A fear of Jesus that shakes your soul and leads you to real hope

Now if you read Mark's gospel, what is clear Is that Jesus doesn't want your fear He wants your faith

After calming the storm Jesus said to his disciples in Mark 4
Why are you so afraid, do you still have no faith?
And when Jairus the synagogue leader was told that his daughter was dead Jesus told Jairus, "Don't be afraid, just believe"
And then he went on to raise Jairus' daughter from the dead
To show Jairus that Jesus can overcome the fear of grief and death

And in John's gospel when comforting Martha grieving the death of her brother Lazarus Jesus gave her one of the most beautiful promises in the bible "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me, even if he dies, will live. ²⁶ Everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" Jesus's resurrection from the dead Is the hope of our own resurrection from the dead And faith in Jesus is the key to experiencing life after death with Jesus Jesus doesn't want your fear he wants your faith

Thankfully from the other gospels we know that the women did not remain in fear And they did not remain silent

Matthew records that the women were afraid yet filled with joy when they ran to tell the disciples
I love how there is this mix of fear and joy in Mary, Mary and Salome As they dash back with the news.
They must have been trying to get their heads around the possibility Could it be real that Jesus has risen from the dead?

But Mark's ending has grown on me over the years Because like the ending of an arthouse indie movie It's meant to make you think about your own response to the resurrection of Jesus

I think Mark's mysterious and abrupt ending is leaving us with homework How will you respond to the resurrection of Jesus? Will you choose faith in Jesus or remain in fear? A life lived gripped by fear is no life at all
And if Jesus has come to bring real hope for our greatest fears
Then you owe it to yourself to get to know him better
And you see if he really rose from the dead.
And can raise us from the dead
Then that's a game changer.

If you're here today and you're not a follower of Jesus
If you came with a Christian today
I think you should ask them why they believe in the resurrection of Jesus
And what the resurrection of Jesus means for them
If you're someone a bit sceptical about whether the resurrection is even believable

I was 37 when my grandfather died after 12 years of dimentia I was in the room when he took his last breath My grandfather's last day on earth was a precious gift to my family from God I conducted his funeral and Psalm 23 was read by my cousin Matthew But this time for me instead of fear there was peace and joy and hope My grandfather trusted in Jesus late in his life Just as my grandmother had done less than year before she died I know that both of them will one day be raised to new life with Jesus And I know that the illness that stole my grandfather's mind and body Will not compare with the resurrection body that Jesus will give him And I knew at age 37 what I didn't know at age 10 That because of Jesus's resurrection Even my greatest fears will not compare to the day When I will see them both again When God himself will wipe away our tears For there will be no more grief, or crying, no more pain No more guilt and shame No more death The Risen Jesus is hope for our fears. Will you choose faith in him this Easter?
